Turn off the outside "noise" for a couple of minutes and consider this message from God's Word.

I am praying that it calms your spirit and encourages your heart.

PSALM 36 (NIV)

FOR THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC. OF DAVID THE SERVANT OF THE LORD.

1 I have a message from God in my heart concerning the sinfulness of the wicked:

There is no fear of God before their eyes.

2 In their own eyes they flatter themselves too much to detect or hate their sin.

3 The words of their mouths are wicked and deceitful; they fail to act wisely or do good.

4 Even on their beds they plot evil; they commit themselves to a sinful course and do not reject what is wrong.

⁵ Your love, Lord, reaches to the heavens, your faithfulness to the skies.

I found that when a passage of Scripture has been very familiar to me for a long time — such as this passage! — if I will simply $slow\ down\ \dots$ take my time . . . and read thoughtfully and reflectively, it can become alive to me in new and fresh ways.

On Sunday we were reminded of Jesus' words that "repentance for the forgiveness of sins will be preached IN HIS NAME to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem." Why is sin so important to God? Why does repentance matter so deeply?

I know, none of us particularly wants to think about sin, repentance or wicked people on a lovely Tuesday morning — especially after taking a day off (if you were able to) after a national holiday.

However, that very holiday, MEMORIAL DAY, exists **because** of sin. It is the sinfulness of human beings that leads to "wars and rumors of war" (Matthew 24:6).

Eugene Peterson paraphrases that verse in this way: "When reports come in of wars and rumored wars, keep your head and don't panic. **This is routine history;** this is no sign of the end. Nation will fight nation and ruler fight ruler, *over and over*" (THE MESSAGE).

It never ends. And now we are in a war against an invisible enemy, the coronavirus that can cause COVID-19. There is no compelling evidence to indicate that this disease was caused by **human** hands . . . the CDC informs us that, although it is

rare, "animal coronaviruses can infect people and then spread between people," and this appears to be the case with the novel coronavirus. https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/faq.html#Coronavirus-Disease-2019-Basics

However, it can be **spread** by human hands. The CDC says "the virus that causes COVID-19 is thought to spread mainly from *person to person*, mainly through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. ...Spread is more likely when people are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet)."

Alas. We are broken people, living on a broken planet, among other broken people. "This is routine history."

And in the middle of the disruption we are living through, we are also impacted by human sinfulness . . . our's, and others'. The church was broken into three times last week. Thieves broke into some storage rooms and stole some tools. Some belonged to the church; some to our wonderful head custodian, Billy Lopez.

One of our staff was fooled by a "phishing" email — from me! Or at least it appeared to be from me. Someone claiming to be me asked them to buy Amazon gift cards for some of our hard-working staff. Many other church and school employees received similar emails. It was a noble gesture. It just wasn't from me. And one staff member, at the end of a very draining work week, took the bait and bought the cards on their own credit card — *this is the good heartedness and faithfulness of our staff!* — and sent them to me. Except it wasn't me. It was thieves deviously posing as me. (FYI, I will make sure that our employers are compensated for this theft, and I am confident you will stand with that decision!)

Sin is upsetting. Sin causes frustration. Sin demoralizes us. Sin makes us angry.

Why do people do such horrible things? As King David puts it, "they fail to act wisely or do good."

What's the remedy?

The remedy begins arriving in verse 5: **"YOUR LOVE, LORD, REACHES TO THE HEAVENS, YOUR FAITHFULNESS TO THE SKIES."**

The **love** of God is bigger than the **sinfulness** of humanity. **"Your love, Lord, reaches to the heavens"!**

The steadfast **faithfulness** of God is more reliable than the **shiftiness** of sinful men and women. **"Your faithfulness, Lord, reaches to the skies."**

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Loving Creator, we **repent** of our sinful ways. We are **grieved** by our hard hearts. We **mourn** that we fear financial setbacks and workplace disruptions more than we revere you: "There is no fear of God before their eyes" (v. 1b). **But Abba, this isn't what we want.** We **want** to know you deeply, revere you more wholeheartedly, and follow you more sincerely. **Teach us to LIVE** in your love that reaches the skies!
